### PROJECT NEWS John Day Basin Virtual Tour and History Exhibit

We continue to work toward creating a Virtual Tour of the John Day Basin that folks can access from their couches at home. If you would like to help this project let me know. jkee@hevanet.com We have developed a strong template but need to run sections by our regional partners to make sure we are representing their message properly.

Thanks to an Oregon Heritage grant, we are working hard this winter on a new cultural exhibit. A River Flows Free. This project will tell the story of the John Day Basin's past 10,000 years of settlement through a series of eight historic "Frontiers": Native American, Explorer, Mining-Military, Bone Hunter/Fossils, Transportation (Trails, rails, highways), Ranching/Settler, Big Timber, to Conservation (today). The project is led by Alchemy of Design, skilled contractors who have developed dynamic exhibits in several Oregon State Parks including Kam Wah Chung Center, Silver Falls, Tryon Creek and at The Oregon Garden. This is big step for the Center to better interpret both the Cultural and Natural heritage of the John Day Basin.

A River Flows Free will tell the Basin's story using new A/V equipment and an exhibit, which we will celebrate at the Center and online next Spring. If you are interested in this project please feel free to contact Project Mgr. Richard Ross, richardnross@earthlink.net.
