THE 2014 SEVEN WONDERS CAMPAIGN

Travel Oregon's 2014 Seven Wonders of Oregon campaign has attracted record numbers of John Day Fossil Beds visitors. Painted Hills visitors surged by 49% last year, thanks to the Seven Wonders campaign. The Painted Hills, the John Day Basin's biggest attraction, hosted 68,340 visitors last year. Total John Day Fossil Beds visits grew by 17% to 184,260 in 2014. Watch out for 2015 Seven Wonders promotions in biking, culinary attractions, and golfing. Wheeler County is planning a new Painted Hills Scenic Bikeway, which connects all units of the National Monument (Clarno, Thomas Condon Visitor Center, and Painted Hills).

SPRING FLOWERS



Spring Flowers decorate the John Day Basin from February to June, in a brilliant succession of colors and blooms in canyons, fields and mountain slopes. At times grassy hillsides are carpeted with vellow Buttercups, Desert Parsley, Balsamroot Sunflowers and blue Lupine. In rocky areas you can find bright red Indian Paintbrush, the purple Sage, Blanket Flower, and the elusive Hedgehog cactus. Along creeks there are vellow Monkey Flowers and Milkweed, the favorite of Monarch Butterflies. There is always a new bouquet coming up.
